### **1** Course Design and Objectives

This graduate course is designed as a Ph.D.-level overview of advanced topics in international political economy. As *Oxford Research Encyclopedias* nicely puts it, "The concept of international political economy (IPE) encompasses the intersection of politics and economics as goods, services, money, people, and ideas move across borders." According to this definition, IPE deals with a wide array of topics ranging from international trade in goods and services, international financial transactions in the forms of foreign direct investment and foreign exchange rate determination to other related issues such as immigration and international organizations. Among all these potential topics, we choose those that have received most scholarly attention in the recent five years and are worthy of our close scrutiny in this semester. Given its level, the course assumes that students have had some background knownledge of the IPE literature and won't go over its traditional theoies and models. Instead, we will only dicuss advanced topics and focus on new theoretical breakthroughs and empirical innovations. As a part of the PHD training, you should criticaly read the methodological details of the assigned readings and aggressively find ways to make your unique contributions to the field.

# Requirements

- 1. Active Participation: Each student is expected to complete all the required reading each week and to contribute to the collective discussion. Keep such questions in mind as you read articles and books listed in the syllabus:
  - What are the central issues at stake in this literature?
  - What are the major arguments of the works under study?

- How do they relate to the debates in the field?
- How valuable and viable is the theory or argument that each puts forth?
- Which scholarly disputes have been resolved?
- What good further work lies ahead?
- 2. Class Presentation: We will have presenters (the number depends on the enrollment) for each week between Week 2 and Week 14. In this 15-minute presentation, you should include:
  - Your understanding of what issues the selected articles and books are dealing with and how they solve these issues
  - Your suggestions for alternative solutions
  - Two questions for class discussion
- 3. A Research Proposal: Each student is also required to submit a research proposal on a topic of his/her own choice (Feel free to talk to me for some advice before you start writing.). In your proposal, you need to **justify** your choice of topic (i.e., why is it puzzling?), **define** your research question (e.g. what is the dependent variable of interest?), **develop** a theoretical argument and testable hypotheses (e.g. what is your explanation?), **identify** your data sources, and **specify** your *methodology*. Your research proposal should not be more than 10 pages, double-spaced, and use times font no smaller than 12 point. The due date of your research proposals is December 27, 2024.
- 4. A Final Project Presentation: Each student has to present his/her research proposal in front of the class in Weeks 15 or 16.
