

Chapter 3: Machinic Philosophy: Assemblages, Information, Chaotic Flow

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1. Assemblage and abstract machine: “life” as machinic becomings (107)
2. “Machine” : assemblages that include nature, human, or technology (112)
3. Assemblage: assemblage of enunciation and machinic assemblage (112, 117); “functional consistency” (117); computational assemblage (8, 123)
4. Translation: as computation? (115)
5. “This power of translation, and the fact that language achieves a greater degree of independence from its material medium, gives it unequaled expressive power” (116) (“absolute deterritorialization” 117-18; abstract machine 119; language as a “probe head” which tracks and directs the emergence and flows of the machinic phylum 129-30?)
6. Abstract machine: imbrication of the virtual and actual (119-20); DeLanda: “attractors” (127, 153)
7. Machinic phylum (124)
